

# COURSE REGISTRATION & UNIVERSITY SYSTEMS

At the University of Warsaw, course registration occurs in at least two rounds each semester. You can register and unregister for courses freely during the registration periods, which are announced on platforms like USOSweb or USOS UL. After classes begin, you have three weeks to adjust your course choices. Most courses allow two absences per semester, but the number may vary. Be sure to check the course syllabus for specific attendance rules and consequences for exceeding the limit.



## USOSWEB

Once you become a student at UW, you will have access to your personal USOSweb account. This online system helps manage various aspects of your academic life. Through USOSweb, you can register for courses, check your grades, view your timetable, apply for accommodation, manage tuition payments, and more. USOSweb also includes the Token Registration Service, where you can sign up for additional courses outside your main faculty, such as foreign language or physical education classes. For these, you may need to obtain tokens, which are virtual credits used for registration.

## EDUROAM WIFI

All students at the University of Warsaw have access to free internet on campus via the eduroam network. To use eduroam, you need your personal login and password from USOSweb.




# STUDENT GOVERNMENT AT THE FACULTY OF PEDAGOGY






## PESEL NUMBER

The PESEL (Universal Electronic System for Registration of the Population) is an important 11-digit national identification number in Poland. It is required for various official processes, such as tax filings, opening a bank account, or creating a Trusted Profile. The PESEL number is free to obtain and is valid for life. Remember to keep your PESEL number safe and only share it with trusted parties.

## BANK ACCOUNT

When you arrive in Poland, it's a good idea to open a local bank account. While you can use a foreign card, having a Polish account can save you money on currency conversion fees and make handling your finances much easier.

### BENEFITS OF A POLISH BANK ACCOUNT

- **Avoid Currency Fees:** Using a foreign account can lead to extra costs due to currency conversion. A local account eliminates these fees.
- **Receive Payments:** If you're receiving a scholarship or other payments from the university, they will usually be transferred to a Polish bank account.
- **Convenience:** Poland has modern banking services, including online banking, contactless payments, and mobile payment systems. It's much easier to manage your finances with a local account.

### DOCUMENTS NEEDED TO OPEN AN ACCOUNT

- Passport or ID card
- Visa or Residence Card
- University certificate (proving your student status)
- PESEL Number (some banks require it)

It's a good idea to contact the bank before you go to check the exact requirements and ask about English-language services.

### FINAL TIP

While opening a Polish bank account isn't mandatory, it makes managing your money much easier and more convenient during your stay. It also gives you access to efficient banking services that can simplify daily transactions.

## ACCOMMODATION

When moving to Warsaw as an international student, finding accommodation is one of the first things to consider. The University of Warsaw offers a variety of options, including residence halls and flats, to make your stay comfortable and affordable.

The university has seven residence halls scattered across the city, offering a total of 2,352 spots.



Each hall provides a study lounge, TV room, computer room, and laundry facilities. Rent for a room typically ranges between 480 PLN and 950 PLN (112–222 EUR) per month, depending on the type of room. To apply, degree programme students can use the USOSweb platform. However, keep in mind that dormitory spots are limited, so it's important to apply early. Short-term students can obtain more information through the International Relations Office.

If you prefer to rent a flat, there are various ways to find accommodation. Facebook groups like "Warszawa mieszkanie wynajem" and online rental websites such as OLX, Gumtree, and Otodom can help you find listings. Renting a flat can be more expensive than staying in a dormitory, but it provides more privacy. To reduce costs, consider sharing a flat with friends or other students.



In general, university dormitories are the most affordable option, with shared rooms costing around 80 to 100 EUR per month. Private dormitories or renting a flat independently can be more expensive, ranging from 250 to 350 EUR per month, but often offer additional amenities such as gyms and security services.



## HEALTHCARE SYSTEM

Poland's healthcare system is well-structured and provides a range of medical services, including emergency care, hospital stays, psychological support, and more. Access to these services depends on the type of health insurance you have.

**For EU Citizens:** If you are an EU citizen, you can access free healthcare in Poland with a valid European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). Make sure you have health insurance in your home country before you travel.


**For Non-EU Citizens:** Non-EU students must have international medical insurance before arriving in Poland. Alternatively, you can sign up for the National Health Fund (NFZ) insurance for a monthly fee of PLN 55.80 (EUR 13). This gives you the same healthcare rights as Polish citizens.





# LIVING IN WARSAW: ESSENTIAL TIPS FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS



Adjusting to life in a new city can be challenging, as it takes time to get familiar with your surroundings, learn new routines, and discover everything a place has to offer. To help you save time and make your transition smoother, we've gathered some of the best advice from students who have already experienced life in Warsaw. ## **WHERE IS THE BEST AND CHEAPEST PLACE TO SHOP?**

The best and cheapest places to shop in Warsaw depend on what you need. For groceries, Biedronka, Achuan and Lidl are the most affordable supermarkets, but they are usually closed on Sundays. In those cases, Żabka stores are a good option. You can also download the apps of this stores for discounts and points, and some Biedronka stores are even open 24 hours. For household items, we recommend Pepco, Jysk, and Ikea, which offer low prices and are usually located nearby.



## **WHEN AND WHERE ARE THE CHEAPEST CINEMA TICKETS?**

Cinemas in Warsaw often have special days when tickets are cheaper. You can check for deals and promotions on websites like [warsawnow.pl](https://warsawnow.pl).



## **INFORMATION ABOUT PUBLIC TRANSPORT – WHERE TO LOOK, HOW TO GET AROUND THE CITY?**

Getting around Warsaw is easy with its well-connected public transport system. To plan your route, we recommend using the [JakDoJade](https://jakdojade.pl) service, available both online and as a mobile app. This tool will help you find the best way to get to your destination, whether you're taking a bus, tram, or metro. If you plan to travel between cities by train, you can check connections on [Rozkład PKP](https://rozklad.pkp.pl) or [Koleo](https://koleo.pl). Keep in mind that there are several train companies in Poland, each operating separately, so it's important to check which one covers your route.



## **WHERE CAN I FIND CHEAP AND SAFE TAXI SERVICES?**

For affordable and safe taxi rides in Warsaw, we recommend using the Bolt or Uber apps. Both services offer reasonable prices and are widely used in the city.

# WHAT ARE THE PUBLIC HOLIDAYS IN WARSAW?

In Poland, public holidays are an important part of the year, and during these times, shopping malls, government offices, banks, and public institutions are typically closed. Additionally, public transport operates on weekend schedules. Here are the key public holidays to keep in mind:

- **1st January** – New Year's Day
- **6th January** – Epiphany
- **Easter Sunday and Easter Monday** – dates vary each year
- **Whit Sunday** – date varies each year
- **1st May** – Labour Day
- **3rd May** – Constitution Day
- **Corpus Christi** – date varies each year
- **15th August** – Armed Forces Day
- **1st November** – All Saints' Day
- **11th November** – Independence Day
- **25th and 26th December** – Christmas

During these holidays, many businesses and public services may be closed or operating with limited hours, so it's essential to plan accordingly if you need to take care of any errands.



# HOW TO CHOOSE A MOBILE PHONE OPERATOR IN POLAND?



In Poland, there are several mobile operators to choose from, each offering different plans and promotions. The most popular ones are: Orange, Play, Plus, T-Mobile, nju mobile and etc.

When you choose your operator, remember that by Polish law, you must register your phone number. Make sure to bring your ID with you when signing your contract and activating your new number. You can do this at the operator's store or showroom.
