# **Instructions for authors Taylor & Francis**

**Structure:** Your paper should be compiled in the following order: authors details (full name and affiliation); title; abstract (same as conference Book of abstracts); keywords (3-5); main text: introduction, materials and methods, results, discussion, references. Additional **author details:** ORCiD number and email address. Authors' affiliations are the affiliations where the research was conducted.

**Word Limits:** 20 000 characters (including spaces) with abstract and references.

**Style Guidelines and formatting:** 12 Times New Roman; leading 1,5; quotation is with a quotation marks ("). Please note that book titles should be in italics. Papers may be submitted in Word (.doc or .docx) and should contain page numbers.

### References

**In- text references include:** the author's last name, the year, and (if relevant) a page number.

#### The references list:

References should be listed alphabetically, then chronologically. When it is possible add DOI number.
